"The Seastream, with her 14 ft beam and her high topsides, is a pretty substantial yacht, which allows for very spacious accommodation.

The owner's after cabin has over 6 ft headroom under the bridgedeck; likewise there is good standing room throughout.

The deck saloon is as big as many people's sitting rooms, the galley one of the largest and best equipped we've seen on any boat, and the two berth guest cabin should prove quite adequately comfortable."

Extracts from an article by Christopher Brasher of The Times, having sailed on Sea Eagle, a Seastream 43, during part of the Scottish Peaks race.

"Next day, Sea Eagle poked her nose out of the shelter of the Small Isles into the Sound of Jura and ran north before the gale.

She made nine knots under shortened sail and as we passed the notorious Whirlpool of Corryvreckan, the wind, full astern, gusted to 48 knots. Add one to the other and you have a wind speed of 57 knots which is 65 miles an hour.

Sea Eagle, a Seastream 43, designed by Ian Anderson, made light of it, bringing us safely home to Oban.

If I ever go to sea again in a gale, may it be in a boat as strong and , as faithful as Sea Eagle."
